LEAVE A GIFT IN YOUR WILL

Each year thousands of ordinary Australians leave a gift in their Will to causes and organisations they care about. Many of these people are just like you.

A gift in your Will is one of the most enduring and inspiring gifts you can give, and offers you the opportunity to continue your support of an organisation you are passionate about.

A gift in your Will to Etz Chayim Progressive Synagogue will help to ensure our future as an inclusive, vibrant and evolving progressive community.

HOW TO LEAVE A GIFT

Before leaving a gift in your Will, we advise you to seek professional advice from a solicitor or Trustee Company for further information and assistance.

If you would like to leave a bequest, there are three main types of gifts to choose from:

A RESIDUAL BEQUEST

After taking care of your family, you can leave all or a percentage of the remainder (residue) of your estate to Etz Chayim.

A PERCENTAGE OF YOUR ESTATE

You can leave a nominated portion or fixed percentage of your estate to Etz Chayim. This means you're less likely to need to update your Will later on.

A SPECIAL BEQUEST

You can leave a sum of money or a specified item to Etz Chayim, such as artwork, jewellery, property, antiques, furniture or shares.

HOW TO LEAVE A GIFT

You can also include Etz Chayim in your Will in the following ways:

- A general purpose bequest to be used by Etz Chayim in an area of most need at the time
- A specific purpose bequest that decides how Etz Chayim is to receive your support
- An endowment fund, named in your honour, where the capital value of your bequest is invested and the interest it earns is used for specific or general purposes by Etz Chayim
